# FREE Safe and Secure Account Management at your Fingertips

In an effort to provide more security and proficiency to our members DCEC will be launching a new application to replace the existing "MyAccount" application online. Smart-Hub will be integrated by the end of March and will allow members to manage more aspects of their DCEC account online or with their mobile devices. If you currently use "MyAccount" online to pay your bill, you will automatically have a SmartHub account online. SmartHub allows for a safer and secure interface where members will be able to view their daily usage as well as save their payment information online. # **Expanding Broadband to Members**

The Delaware County Broadband Initiative (DCBI) project will expand broadband service to the rural un-served and underserved DCEC members. DCEC, Margaretville Telephone Company (MTC), and Delhi Telephone Company (DTC) are working together to extend a fiber-to-the-home (FTTH) network using existing and new infrastructure. The services and products that would be available to residents and businesses within the dedicated project area would be a combination of voice, video, and broadband. To view a map of the proposed phases and service areas please refer to our website and click on "Learn More About Broadband". Phase 2 expansion plans are still under development.

Fiber maps for each town involved will be developed once contracts with NYS Empire State Development Agency (ESD) are signed. In addition, public meetings will be scheduled with the project team and maps will be displayed. Until the project team has documents signed with ESD, no construction can

occur and no funds can be expended.

Funding for this project is due to a NYS Southern Tier Economic Development Council grant, the Catskill Watershed Corporation, the Town of Hardenburgh Rising Community Program, and 3.7 million in private investments by MTC and DTC. Estimated total for phase 1 of the Delaware County Broadband Initiative is about \$6,700,000.00

### Interruption of Service and What you Need to Know

Members can assist DCEC with the restoration of power following an interruption of service as follows: Prior to calling the DCEC office to report an interruption of service to your home, farm or place of business please check the display face of the electric service meter to determine its status. If you see numerical figures displayed by the meter, then it is likely that the loss of service that you are experiencing may be associated with your premises' internal wiring. Informing DCEC about the status of the electric service meter at the time when you call to report an interrup-



### **Proposed Formulary Rate Increase**

The Board of Directors is proposing a 0.64 cent/kWh formulary rate increase, which would take effect on April's bills. The rate change would appear on members' bills on the line called "Formulary Rate Adj." The formulary rate adjustment is charged on each kWh consumed. For example, a typical residential member consumes approximately 920 kWh in a month.

### 920 kWh @ \$0.0064 = \$5.89 increase per month

The formulary rate adjustment has been in use by the Cooperative since April of 2013 as a way to make minor adjustments as frequently as every 6 months. In years past, the Cooperative had infrequent, but large rate increases. That form of rate making created financial instability for the Cooperative. Since its inception in April of 2013, the formulary rate adjustment has had values as shown in the figure below:



The formulary rate adjustment can increase or decrease following the board of director's semi-annual formulary

During the year 2015 DCEC will again be clearing trees and brush from our primary distribution lines in Delaware and Schoharie counties. Once the trees have been cut, a ready-to-use herbicide known as Garlon-4 will be applied to the stump to prevent undesirable future sprouting. DCEC is licensed and registered with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation to purchase, store and apply this herbicide. ### **Environmental Hazards**

This pesticide is toxic to fish. Do not apply directly to water, to areas where surface water is present, or to intertidal areas below the mean high water mark. Do not contaminate water when clearing equipment or disposing of equipment washwaters. This chemical has properties and characteristics associated with chemicals detected in groundwater. Grazing Lactating Dairy Animals: Do not allow lactating dairy animals to graze treated areas until the next growing season following application of this product. Do not harvest hay for 14 days after application. Portions of grazed areas that intersect treated non-cropland, rights-of-way and forestry sites may be treated at up to 8 lb ae per acre if the area to be treated on the day of application comprises no more than 10% of the total grazable area

**Slaughter Restrictions:** During the season of application, withdraw livestock from grazing treated grass at least 3 days before slaughter. **Avoid Injurious Spray Drift:** 

Make applications only when there is little or no hazard from spray drift. Small quantities of spray, which may not be visible, may seriously injure susceptible plants. 

# **Equipment Used by DCEC - The Fuse**

Articles in previous editions of this Newsletter have pertained to various devices and equipment that are used in the electrical distribution system to provide safe and reliable service to member's homes and businesses. This edition presents information about one of the industry's earliest and still often used devices - the fuse.

The fuse has been used to provide a simple yet effective method of protecting electric power systems from overcurrent conditions in a variety of ways for nearly 135 years. Its operation is very basic: the fuse will open (or "blow") in response to current flow for a specified period of time. Over the years, the fuse has been developed and improved so that its operation is accurate and predictable even under extreme weather conditions. Every fuse in use by DCEC has a specific time versus current characteristic describing its behavior.

DCEC uses several different types of fuses in the protection of the electrical power system. All of DCEC's substation transformers are protected by specialty fuses designed for such applications. More plentiful on the DCEC system

is the expulsion fuse which is generally used along with its "cutout" holder to protect single phase lines and laterals that branch from the main distribution feeders to serve member's locations. A photo showing a typical cutout that has an internally mounted expulsion fuse is shown below.



It is anticipated that the fuse will retain an important role in the protection of the DCEC electrical distribution system for many years to come.

# **Operations Update**


### **Pole Replacement & Line Reconstruction:**
